Autocross at Richmond International Raceway

Saturday, April 9 the Shenandoah Region of the PCA along with Euroclassics Porsche will be able to once again stretch our cars' legs at the Richmond International Raceway. We will be on the ³/₄ mile course, in the infield, and have full access to the facilities from a unique view. The sights and sounds of this event are like no other, with a ground level look out from the center of the track, and there is nothing like listening to a car running down the back straight at high RPM against 97,000 empty aluminum seats. This is truly a great event and one you will not want to miss if you are into autocrossing, interested in seeing what your car can do on a track in safe conditions, or just interested in what a 14 degree banked turn feels like. After a couple-year break from this venue, we are happy to once again bring this event to the area's automotive enthusiasts.

Porsches and other makes of cars are welcome to participate and enjoy the event with us. Drivers and spectators do not need to be PCA members. Loaner helmets and instruction for novice drivers are provided. This event will be held rain or shine.

Details

- Our normal format of running: 2 heats, three runs each
- A drive through for everyone prior to your 1st heat
- The course will be coned and floured for ease of navigation through the event.
- The course will use all aspects of the NASCAR track and will include a slalom up the entire pit lane, and then up onto the track for one and a half laps.
- The track is 3/4 mile long with 14 degree banking on a 60-foot wide race surface.
- Porsche classes as well as other makes will be competing for class and Fastest Time of the Day honors and our usual top ten time list. The three times we held this event before, FTD was 75 seconds.
- There will be a practice autocross course in the infield to warm up and prepare your cars. This course will be open all day, and the amount you run on it is unlimited.
- Enter the track through Gate 10, follow the road left behind the track, and go through the tunnel.





YOU'LL FIND INTERESTING PORSCHES AT MANY CAR SHOWS

One of the nice things about car shows, be they cruise-ins in your own back yard, club meets, PCA corrals on race weekends, or national shows like the Amelia Island Concours, is that you will always encounter some gems, Porsches included, that will make the trip well worthwhile.

I have many car museums on my personal bucket list, but a lot of them are so distant that it will take a concerted effort to get to all of them. Several car shows are a reasonable drive (or flight) from Central Virginia and some of them have a fresh cast of cars and characters each year.

The low-key atmosphere at a show also means you can chat up the owners, most of whom are more than willing to talk about their pride and joy.

In 2010, I started my show circuit at Amelia Island. The legendary Porsche 917 was one of the featured models, so I couldn't pass up that event.

There were nine 917s on the lawn at Amelia, which I mention in passing since I gushed at length about it in the April 2010 Heat Exchanger.

But wait, there's more: Amelia also drew a rare 1952 Glöckler-Porsche 356 owned by Californians Herb and Rose Wysard, which won the Amelia Award for 1945-55 Race Cars. This predecessor of a long line of Porsche racing cars was imported and raced by distributor Max Hoffman, who introduced Americans to the Porsche brand.

Like the grouping of 917s at Amelia, I may never see this car again.

I've been to Amelia Island for three straight years and it is terrific. You owe yourself at least one visit.

The Sebring 12 Hours is held the weekend after Amelia. In addition to the endurance classic, you will find many Porsches to drool over at the PCA Porscheplatz, in the support races, and in the track museum.

The PCA Porsche Corral at the Grand Am race at VIR each spring and the Porscheplatz at the ALMS race each fall at Road Atlanta also offer plenty of Porsches to admire. And, don't miss the racing Porsches in the pits and paddock. Grand Am and ALMS events let lowly ticket holders get up close and personal.

Our own Richmond Porsche Meet (RPM) in June offered a very nice concours as well. I had to work that morning and then got lost on the way, so I arrived breathless as the first cars were leaving the show grounds. I promise to do better this year. (Jim Condon and Bill Sanders had a great photo spread on this event in the July 2010 HE.)

In August, I found some Porsches to salivate over at two unlikely venues.

The first was the annual Tutto Italiano Italian Car show in Brookline, Mass. (Italian, you say? I know. I also have a weakness for Fiats and Alfas.)

There were no Porsches in the show proper. But Porsche owners attend the show, and there was a designated parking area for special non-Italian cars. The lesson here: When you go to a car show, don't forget to stroll though the spectator lot. At this venue, I took in a very nice early 911 and a – well I don't know what it was. It looked like a Porsche 550 Spyder to my untrained eye.

RUSS'S RAMBLINGS

t finally feels like the worst of winter may be behind us. We had a string of about 5 or 6 days in February that really felt like spring. I got the Carrera out of the garage and did a little cruising around the country roads west of Richmond. I hope you were able to do the same and take advantage of the break from winter.

I took care of a couple of projects on my Carrera during the last month. First, I purchased four new Michelin Sport tires for my 911. One of the problems I have is my tires always go bad and lose their "stick" long before the tread wears out. This is because I only put about 1000 miles a year on my car. When I installed my new Michelins, the Bridgestones that came off the car looked great except for the 2002 date code. I can tell when it is time to get new tires, because my 911's rear-end wants to swap places with my front-end at speed in the "twisties". Anyway, I am very happy with the new Michelins and my \$70 rebate AMEX card compliments of Michelin.

I also tweaked my height adjustment a bit (front was a bit too high) and then got the car aligned. Let me stop and say, the proper time to set your ride height is when you are corner balancing the car. Since I no longer participate in track events, the "tape measure and angle meter method" of height adjustment works fine for my street car. If you do track or autocross your car, a professional corner balancing and height adjustment is critical for optimum handling.

I used Mincz Tire here in Richmond for my four-wheel alignment. Their alignment person (Red) will align it to factory specs or to your custom specifications. I have my own specs that I use for an aggressive street setup (as opposed to a track setup), and after about two hours, Red had it dialed-in and was ready for the test drive. I was very pleased and the car handled like it was on rails. There are several good alignment shops in our Region, but I have been using Mincz for years and have always been happy with their work.

My final project was to deal with a stubborn fuel filler door. My situation was that when I pulled the knob in the cockpit to open the fuel filler door, the knob would move but the fuel door would not open. I have been dealing with these cars long enough to know that continuing to yank on the knob was not the way to fix the problem. My technical diagrams showed that the cockpit knob is connected to fuel door release lever by an 18 inch long cable (actually, it is more like thin coathanger wire).

What happens is that, with the passage of time, the fuel door cable will attract some surface rust and grit. This in turn will cause the cable to bind and stick in the tube that carries it between the cockpit and the fuel door opening. The solution is actually very simple, but not without some items of caution. You first need to remove the fuel door cable from the car. Inside the fuel filler opening, you will see the end of the cable where it connects with the "claw" on the fuel door release lever. Simply remove the brass cap from the end of the cable and pull the cable out of the car using the black knob in the cockpit (do not remove the knob from the cable).

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YOU'LL FIND INTERESTING PORSCHES AT MANY CAR SHOWS

I guess it was one of those amazing reproductions from Chuck Beck's shop in Georgia, but it had Porsche running gear. It drew a crowd, and none of us could spot any telltale clues. It also sported a "1000 Miglia FIA" sticker on the windscreen. If it was the real McCoy, the lingering question is: Who would be rich and eccentric enough to drive a real 550 Spyder on the streets of Boston?

After a week in New Hampshire, I ventured over to the Hemmings Sports & Exotic Car Show at Saratoga Springs, N.Y. This show welcomes all imports and BMW was the featured marque in 2010. But they also had a nice row of Porsches over which to drool.

The selection included a very clean 1964 356, but the restored 1968 911L, which was driven in the SCCA Trans-Am series by Bob Bailey, caught my eye, and that of the judges as well.

This was one of six built by the factory for racing and scored some fine second place finishes in the Trans-Am series' under 2-liter class. Like many racecars, it passed through several hands and was left to disintegrate.

This 911, however, was rescued. And, after extensive restoration,

it was repurchased by Bailey, the man who raced it in the late 1960s.

The Hemmings show is held on the grounds of the Saratoga Automobile Museum, which is worth going to if you are already there, although it does not offer much for import car buffs. (Exceptions are the 1956 Ferrari Indy car and 1935 Maserati V8 (dubbed "Poison Lil") which were in the second floor "Racing in New York" display.)

Then it was back home to Virginia for the Classics on the Green (Formerly Classics on the James), which was held at the New Kent Winery, southeast of Richmond. Porsche was the featured marque for this formerly British car show and there were plenty of Stuttgart's finest to behold.

I struck up a conversation with First Settlers PCA stalwart Sam Gassel, who had his 1973 Penske Sunoco 911 RSR tribute car.

OK, before you start, a tribute car is not the same as the original, but the original of this particular car would literally be made out of unobtainium, since it was raced, wrecked, repaired and then raced and wrecked again.

A loyal member of the notorious "R-Gruppe" of Porsche 911 hot rodders, Sam reckons he has built at least 14 other 911 variants, but this is his masterpiece.

Gassel went all out on this project and reckons "it's as close as I could get within reason," adding that he had to balk at purchasing some very pricey components that were used by the Penske boys in building a world-beater for Mark Donohue and George Follmer to drive.

The original led and "almost won" the 1973 24 Hours of Daytona, until it was sidelined by a parts failure. The Brumos Porsche inherited the victory and the rest is history.

Donohue and Follmer went back to dominating the 1973 Can-Am in their Porsche 917-30s. The Sunoco blue 911 RSR was destroyed (the first time) by Milt Minter in Canada.

RUSS'S RAMBLINGS

Let me stop with a word of caution. DO NOT remove the cotter pin that holds the fuel door release lever to the car. If you do remove the cotter pin, the hidden spring beneath the fuel door release lever will come out at speeds in excess of Mach 3! Assuming you are not hit by the flying projectile (not a good thing), you will probably never find it again because it will end up in the next block or your neighbor's garage. I am not even going to describe the procedure to put it all back together (assuming you survived taking it apart), but suffice to say you will never do it again. OK, back to repairing the cable.

Now that the cable was out of the car, I inspected it for cracks or excessive wear. Mine was fine except for some surface rust. I took some very fine sandpaper and cleaned all the surface rust and grit from the cable. Next, get some grease and wipe the grease onto the cable. Not a lot, but enough that the grease adheres to the metal cable. Then it is just a matter of feeding the fuel door release cable back through its tube from the cockpit opening into the fuel filler opening. This may take a few tries because of the twists and turns in the tube, but it will eventually work out. I found that twisting the cable while feeding it through its tube helped, and I got it on my third attempt. Now I can go to the gas station with the confidence I will not look like a fool trying to coax my fuel filler door to open.



I honestly believe that 99% of all the parts ever made for a Porsche are available there (if you have the time and patience to look). I see stuff there that I have no clue what I am looking at. You can get some great deals on parts, wheels, cars...whatever. I suggest that if you do go, make a "wish list" beforehand so you can stay somewhat focused as you walk the acres of Porsche vendors.

We have some great events coming up and I am looking forward to driving on my new tires in the beautiful Virginia springtime weather. A flyer for RPM was included in the latest issue of the Heat Exchanger. The dates for RPM are June 11-12. I encourage you to register because it is a fun event with lots of great activities.

Gassel did a whole lot of research to make his tribute Porsche as authentic as possible and then did most of the work himself in his two-car garage, which he said he shares with a couple of stray cats. "I do all my own welding and fabrication," Gassel said, adding that he even built his own overflow bottle and fuel filler neck to make the car more authentic. He also painted the car in his garage, but had a friend with a paint shop add the clear coat.

"If you squint and look quickly, you can't tell it from the original. I went for a lot of visual clues. In the interior, you really have to be an expert to tell the difference," he said.

Gassel admits the car was not quite finished when he showed it at New Kent.

"It was leaking some fluids and I was worried I was going to ruin the grass, but it was dry there so it was brown anyway," he said, chuckling.

The completed car took best of show a few weeks later at the First Settlers' Air & Auto Classic in Virginia Beach, which Gassel helped organize. I'll have to add that show to my list this year.


The bottom line of this thesis is: You can find some truly splendid Porsches at car shows, even the mixed make shows.



BOOK EXCHANGER

PORSCHE: A History of Excellence

Randy Leffingwell Motorbooks ISBN-13: 9780760340165



PORSCHE: A History of Excellence is a new 9 X 10 inch "flexibound" book. (According to China-printing.org, flexi binding is intermediate between paperback and hardback binding, and it

is "a less expensive option than hardback binding, but offers a higher perceived value than a traditional paperback.") The front cover shows the new 918, and the publisher's blurb praises the new book as the "fully updated and revised" successor to the larger hardbound book PORSCHE: Sixty Years that they published in 2008. A lot has happened in the Porsche world since 2008, so I looked forward to reading Porsche: A History of Excellence. Unfortunately, I was disappointed to discover that only the title and cover are new. I was unable to find any changes inside. There is nothing about the 918, the Panamera, the "generation two" 911, Boxster, and Cayman, the 2009 direct fuel-injection (DFI) engine, or the PDK transmission. The photos, captions, text, number of pages, and layout of each page all appear to be exactly the same as in Porsche: Sixty Years. Perhaps a few old typos have been fixed, but otherwise you will find nothing new in Porsche: A History of Excellence. The bottom line here is caveat emptor. Don't expect a new or even fully updated and revised book just because it has a new title and cover.

I reviewed PORSCHE: Sixty Years favorably for the November 2008 issue of the Heat Exchanger, and you can still find my review on-line at http://shn.pca.org/bookreviews.php. Obviously, that review still applies to the nearly identical Porsche: A History of Excellence; and the smaller flexibound edition is cheaper, only about \$21 at amazon.com. Just don't expect anything new or different if you already own Porsche: Sixty Years.
